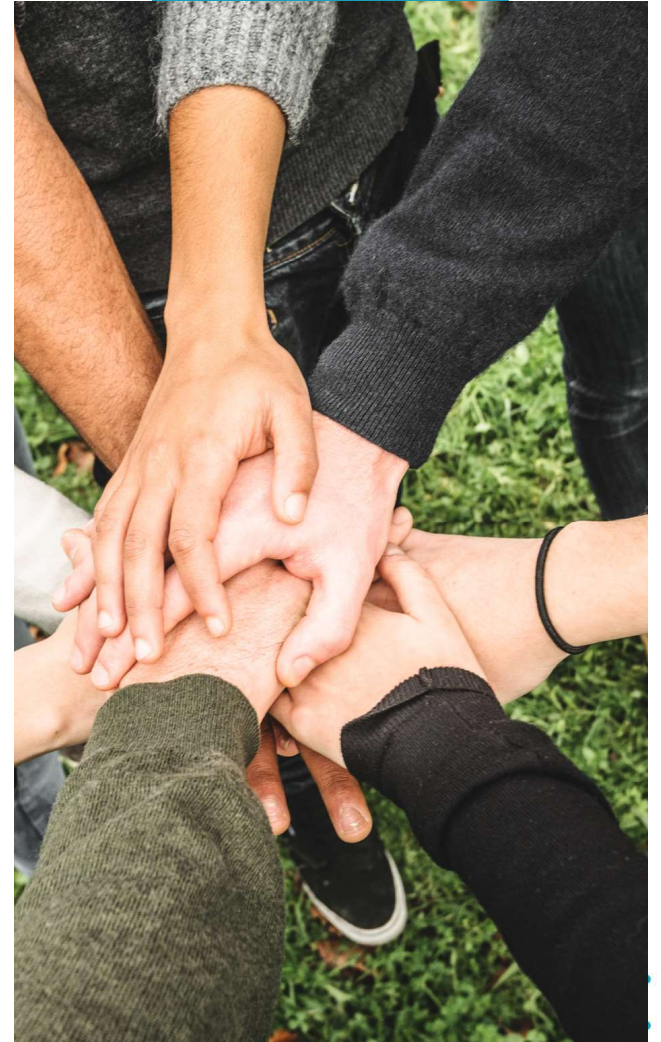

Volunteer Waterloo Region provides services to strengthen the capacity of community organizations to engage volunteers in leadership and the delivery of services.

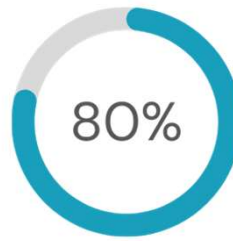
As a community leader we leverage our expertise to promote, engage, connect, and coach others about volunteerism in Waterloo Region.

The contribution from volunteers is massive.

Pre-pandemic:

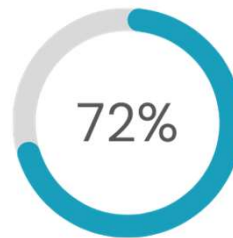
- Volunteers across Canada annually contributed **2.2 billion volunteer hours**.
- Volunteers' work contribution is equal to **2.7% of Canadian GDP**. For reference, that is equivalent to the time worked by the entire education sector. In Waterloo Region that equates to \$1.2 Billion
- **48% of adults (15+)** were volunteering in a formal setting in **Waterloo Region**.



Volunteers allow the organization to provide services or levels of services it otherwise could not provide



Volunteers provide cost savings to the organization



Volunteers increase the quality of services or programs provided.

- recruit more volunteers, including those in key audiences (e.g., corporate)
