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Purpose of the Report Card

Evaluate the two strategic actions completed in 2024:

- 1. Accelerate Commercial Business Approvals
- 2. Advance Truth and Reconciliation
- ► Reflect on the development and implementation of the 2023–2026 Strategic Plan
- Provide feedback and recommendations to inform future planning.



Evaluation Approach

We assessed projects using four main criteria:

- 1. Responsible Project Delivery
- 2. Impact/Public Value
- 3. Transparency & Communication
- 4. Public Engagement

Projects were **rated** using the following **rating scale**:

- Exceeds expectations
- Meets expectations
- Does not meet expectations

An equity lens underpinned the evaluation of all projects



Project 1 - Accelerate Commercial Business Approvals

Rating: Exceeds Expectations

- Delivered on time with strong cross-departmental collaboration.
- Identified 55 improvements—65% were "quick wins."
- New tools introduced: business roadmap guide, pre-application process, digital permit review.
- On-site team visits improved clarity and reduced approval timelines.
- Translation and interpretation services available for use on site visits, enhancing accessibility.
- Public engagement was user-focused and robust.

Key Recommendation:

Expand beyond the downtown core and engage equity-seeking business communities.



Project 2 - Advance Truth & Reconciliation

Rating: Exceeds Expectations

- Commendable shift: from time-bound deliverables to a relational, ongoing commitment
- City is learning, adapting, and acting as a respectful partner, not a lead
- Example: Wiinjiindamaan Project, city supported Indigenous-led initiative
- City demonstrated sensitivity in shaping communications about this project, respectful of the fact the that project leadership came from the group of collaborating entities rather than from a single entity
- Key Recommendation:
 - Continue to embed Truth & Reconciliation across all departments and communicate progress in ways that elevate Indigenous leadership



Strategic Plan Implementation - Reflections

- City's adaptive planning model is a major strength
- Public engagement was more inclusive than ever
- Resident panel stood out
- Use of project charters and mid-point check-ins shows progress in planning maturity
- Improved focus on outcomes, not just outputs

Suggestions

Clarify Compass Kitchener's role in engagement initiatives Continue to publish progress data and budget information Strengthen storytelling to show how the plan affects residents' daily lives

Several previously incomplete projects are now complete or progressing well:

- Downtown Cycling Network (complete)
- Incubator and Accelerator Project (in progress)
- City-Owned Property Review (complete)
- Rosenberg Community Centre Business Case (complete)
- Bramm Yards Vision (complete)
- Open Space Strategy (Phase 1 complete)
- Arts and Creative Industries Action Plan (in progress)

Observation

The City's adaptive approach has enabled carryforward and continuity across planning cycles.



Looking Ahead: Key Themes

- Continue to address key complex challenges: housing, climate change, social isolation
- Prioritize completion of the Arts and Culture Action Plan
- Improve access to budget data to support deeper evaluation, and
- Shift evaluations toward strategic goal progress, not just completed projects.
